# Social Equity Program Purpose & Goal

- **Purpose:** The Rhode Island Social Equity Program is dedicated to fostering an inclusive and equitable cannabis industry by addressing the historical injustices and disproportionate impacts of cannabis prohibition on marginalized communities
- **Goal:** The Rhode Island Social Equity Program's goal is to promote economic empowerment, social justice, and community reinvestment through support and equitable opportunities for individuals and communities disproportionately affected by past cannabis laws.

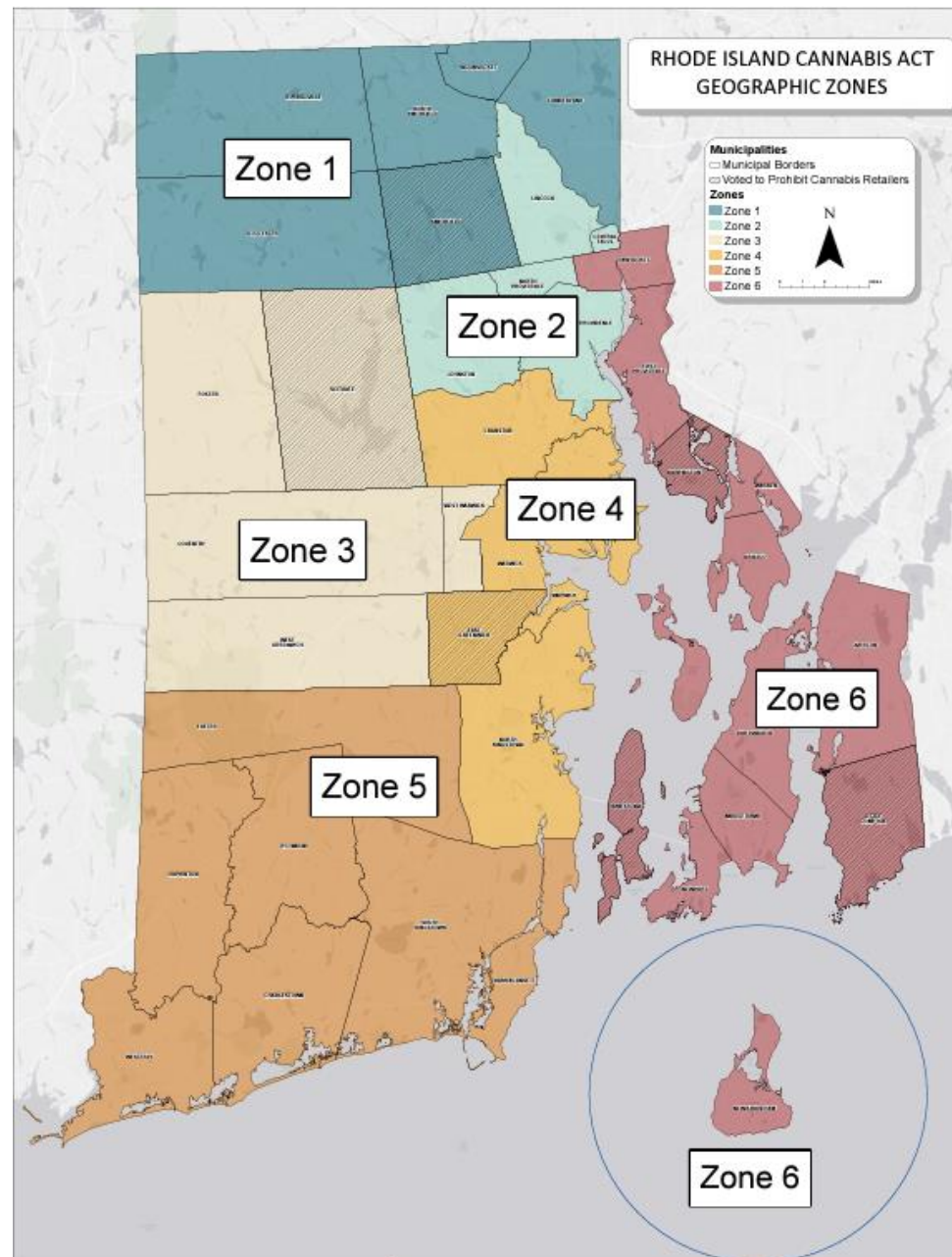

# (Part I)

## What is an applicant?

- An “applicant” means:

a Rhode Island resident or a business entity with a principal place of business located in Rhode Island to include, but not limited to, a corporation, limited liability company, limited liability partnership or partnership, and in which fifty-one percent (51%) of the equity in the business entity is owned by residents of Rhode Island, and the Rhode Island resident or business entity has made application for issuance of a license or certificate to own or engage in a cannabis business subject to the provisions of this chapter.

## (Part II)

# What is a social equity applicant?

- "Social equity applicant" means:

An applicant (as defined in the previous slide) that has been disproportionately impacted by criminal enforcement of marijuana laws, including individuals convicted of nonviolent marijuana offenses, immediate family members of individuals convicted of nonviolent marijuana offenses and individuals who have resided in disproportionately impacted areas for at least five (5) of the last ten (10) years, as determined by the commission after consultation with the cannabis advisory board, and further specified in the rules and regulations that shall identify factors and other considerations to be evaluated in certifying applicants as social equity applicants, provided that such applicants shall at a minimum meet one of the following criteria:

# (Part II, continued)

## What is a social equity applicant?

“...provided that such applicants shall at a minimum meet one of the following criteria:

- (i) An applicant with at least fifty-one percent (51%) ownership and control by one or more individuals who have resided for at least five (5) of the preceding ten (10) years in a disproportionately impacted area.

## Part II:

Social Equity Applicant shall at a minimum meet one of the following criteria:

- (i) An applicant with at least fifty-one percent (51%) ownership and control by one or more individuals who have resided for at least five (5) of the preceding ten (10) years in a disproportionately impacted area.

**Ownership & residence history in Disproportionately Impacted Area**

(i) An applicant with at least fifty-one percent (51%) ownership and control by one or more individuals who have resided for at least five (5) of the preceding ten (10) years in a disproportionately impacted area.

**OR**

**Cannabis-related criminal history**

(ii) An applicant with at least fifty-one percent (51%) ownership and control by one or more individuals who:

- (A) Have been arrested for, convicted of, or adjudicated delinquent for any offense that is eligible for expungement under this chapter; or
- (B) Is a member of an impacted family.

**OR**

**Workforce demographics**

(iii) For applicants with a minimum of ten (10) full-time employees, an applicant with at least fifty-one percent (51%) of current employees who:

- (A) Currently reside in a disproportionately impacted area; or
- (B) Have been arrested for, convicted of, or adjudicated delinquent for any offense that is eligible for expungement under this chapter or is a member of an impacted family.

**OR**

**Economic empowerment**

(iv) Can demonstrate significant past experience in or business practices that promote economic empowerment in disproportionately impacted areas.

**OR**

**Meets income qualifications**

(v) Had income which does not exceed four hundred percent (400%) of the median income, as defined by the commission, in a disproportionately impacted area for at least five (5) of the past ten (10) years.

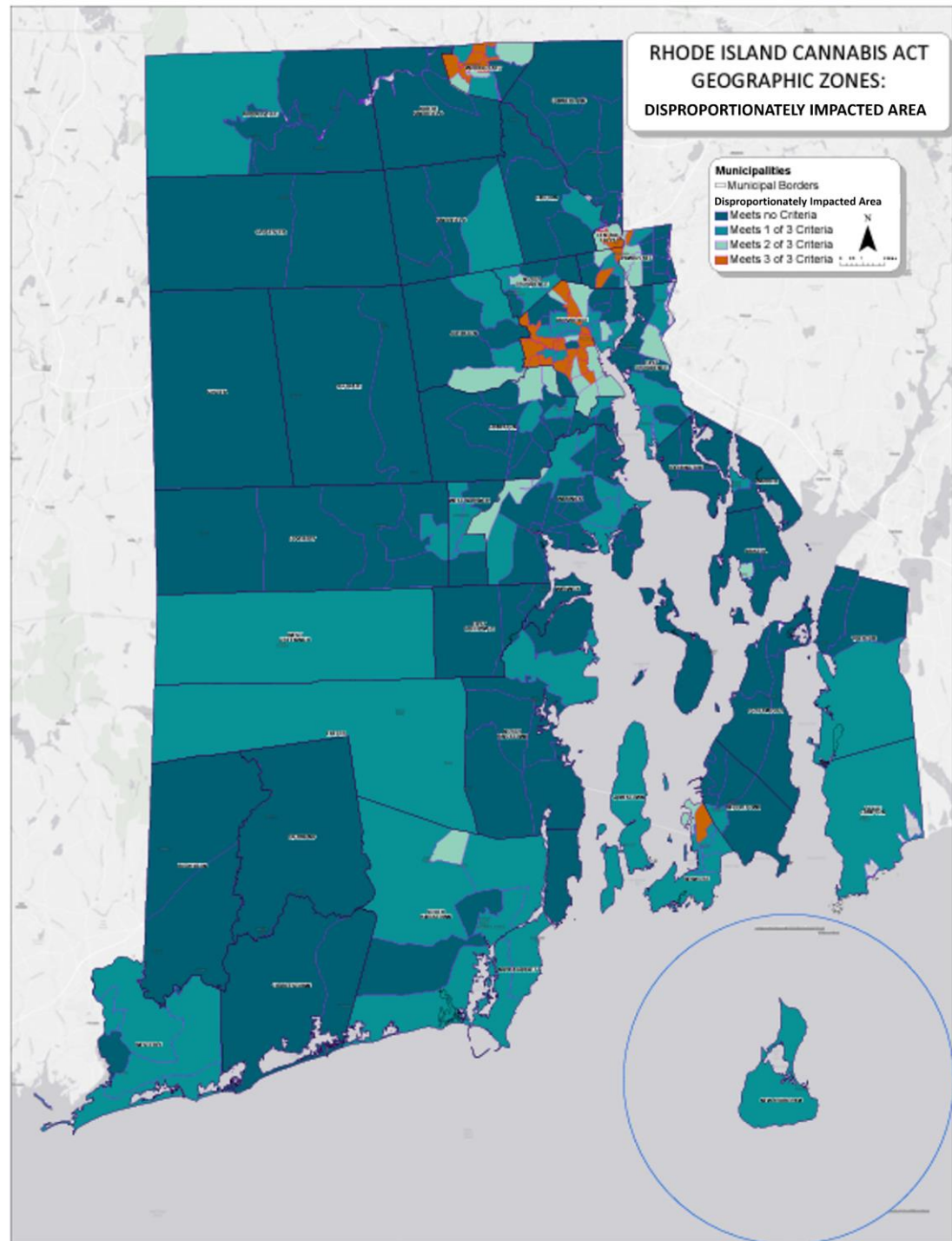


# Defining Rhode Island's Disproportionately Impacted Areas

(23) "Disproportionately impacted area" means a census tract or comparable geographic area that satisfies at least one of the following criteria as determined by the commission, that:

- (i) The area has a poverty rate of at least twenty percent (20%) according to the latest federal decennial census;
- (ii) Seventy-five percent (75%) or more of the children in the area participate in the federal free lunch program according to reported statistics from the Rhode Island board of education;
- (iii) At least twenty percent (20%) of the households in the area receive assistance under the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP);
- (iv) The area has an average unemployment rate, as determined by the Rhode Island department of labor and training, that is more than one hundred twenty percent (120%) of the national unemployment average, as determined by the United States Department of Labor, for a period of at least two (2) consecutive calendar years preceding the date of the application; or
- (v)(A) The area has disproportionately high rates of arrest, conviction, and incarceration related to the sale, possession, use, cultivation, manufacture, or transportation of cannabis in comparison to other communities and localities in the state; or
  - (B) The area has a history of arrests, convictions, and other law enforcement practices in a certain geographic area, such as, but not limited to, precincts, zip codes, neighborhoods, and political subdivisions, reflecting a disparate enforcement of cannabis prohibition during a certain time period, when compared to the remainder of the state.
- (vi) The commission shall, with recommendations from the cannabis advisory board and the chief equity officer, issue guidelines to determine how to assess which communities have been disproportionately impacted and how to assess if someone is a member of a community disproportionately impacted.

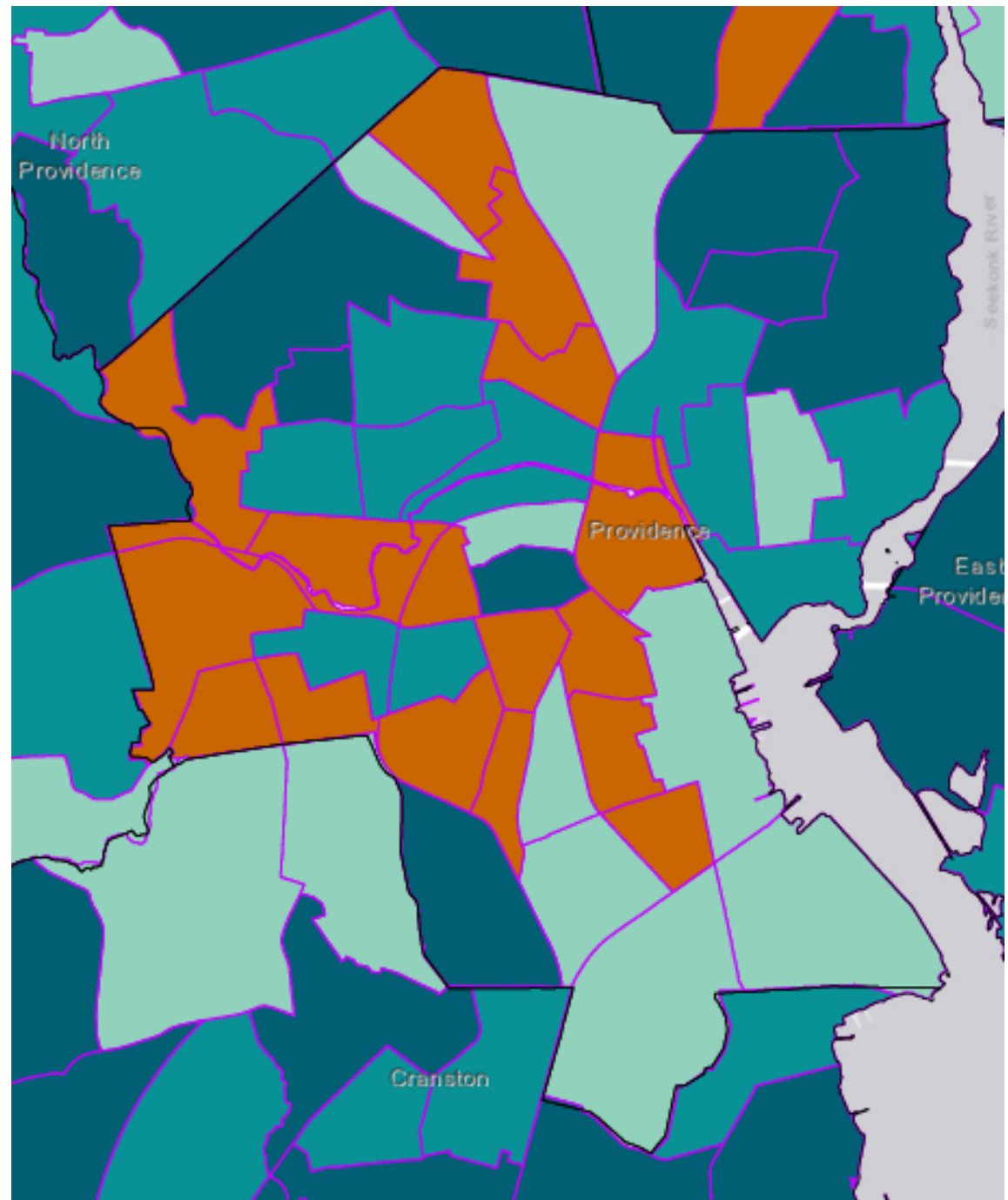
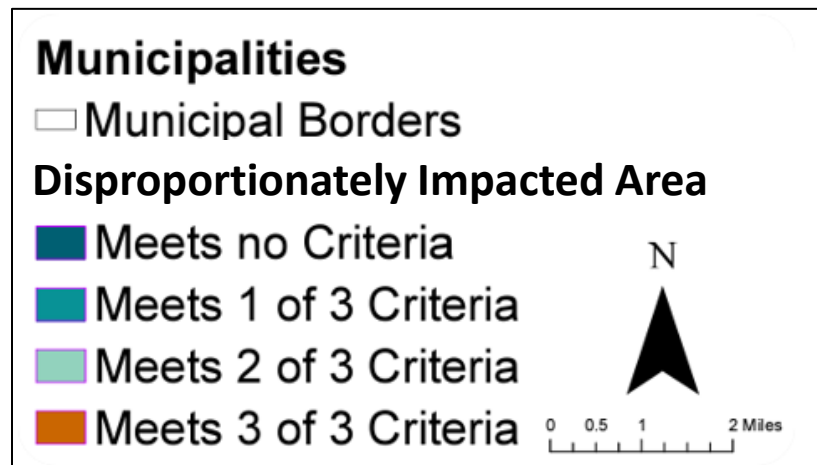
## SNAP, Unemployment Rate, and Poverty Rate

  - 6 out of 13 total census tracts in Woonsocket



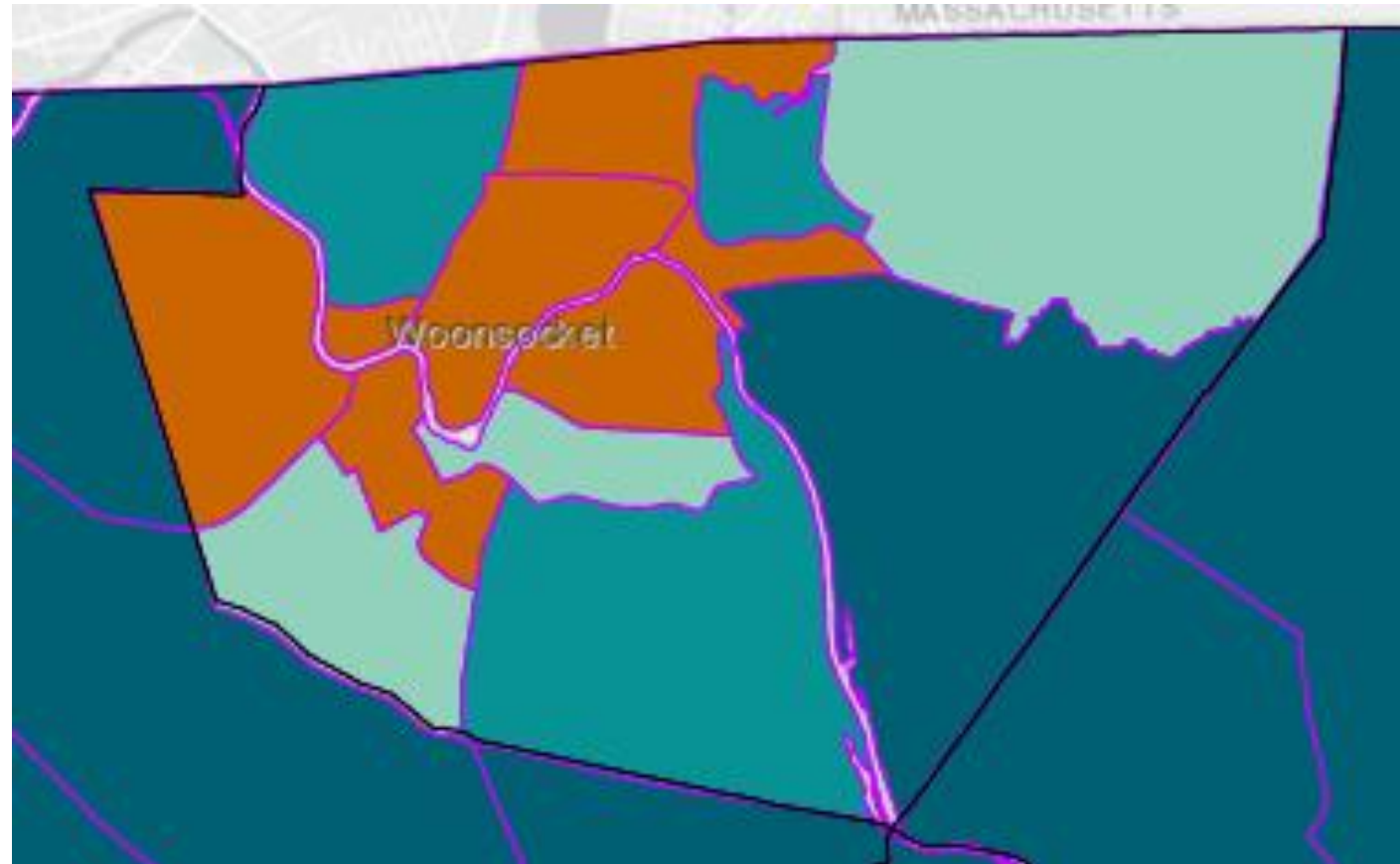
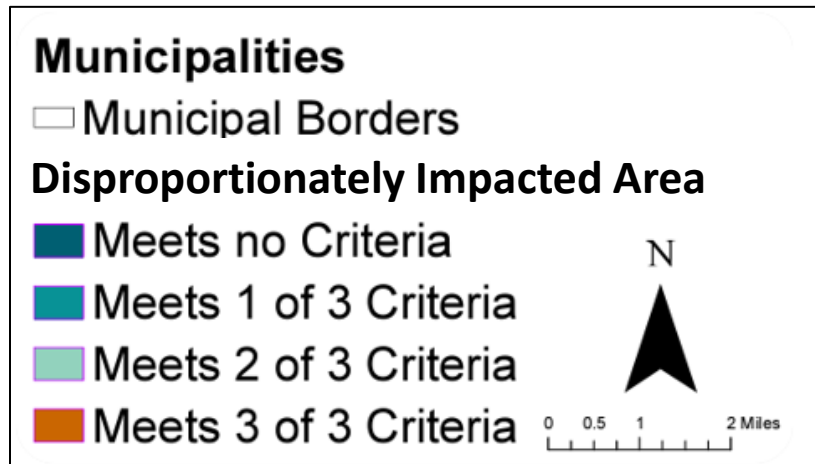

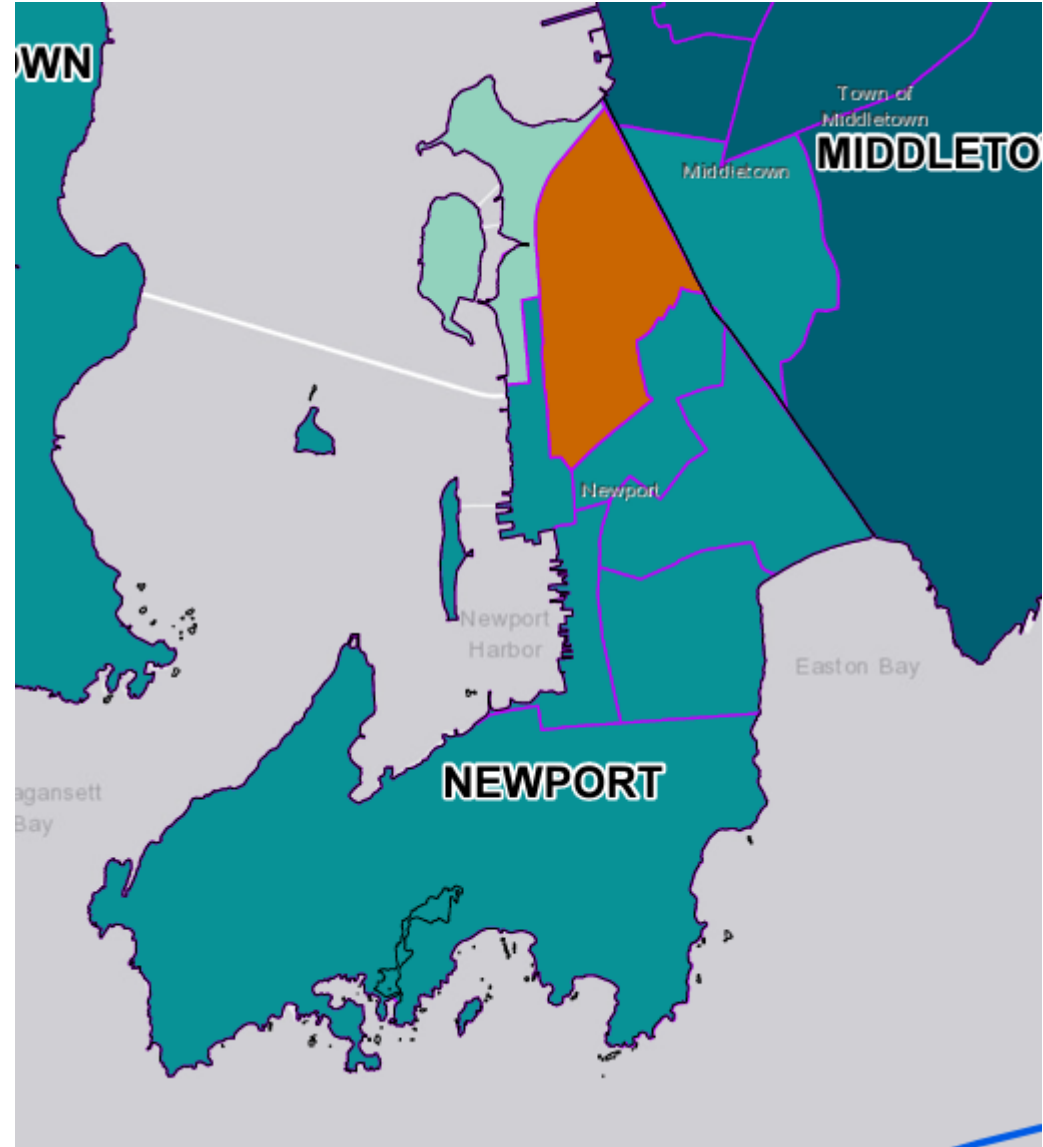

# Applicant Prioritization in the Rhode Island Cannabis Act

- Section 21-28.11-31(h) makes clear that social equity provisions of the Act, including the social equity program, is to be a priority of the Commission and not merely an afterthought.
- This is evidenced by the fact that the language of § 21-28.11-31(f)(2) provides that if an applicant is not able to qualify for social equity status, that the applicant may pay all required fees and proceed to seek licensure as a non-social equity applicant:

§ 21-28.11-31(f)(2): "If the commission determines that an applicant who applied as a social equity applicant is not eligible for social equity status, the applicant shall be provided an additional ten (10) days to provide alternative evidence that the applicant qualifies as a social equity applicant. Alternatively, the applicant may pay all required fees and be considered as a non-social equity applicant. If the applicant cannot do either, then any application fee shall be returned and the application process shall be terminated."

That is, if a social equity applicant does not meet the requirements for "social equity status," they are then eligible to apply for licensure as a non-social equity applicant.

Therefore, cannabis retail licensing cannot proceed until qualification of social equity applicants takes place.

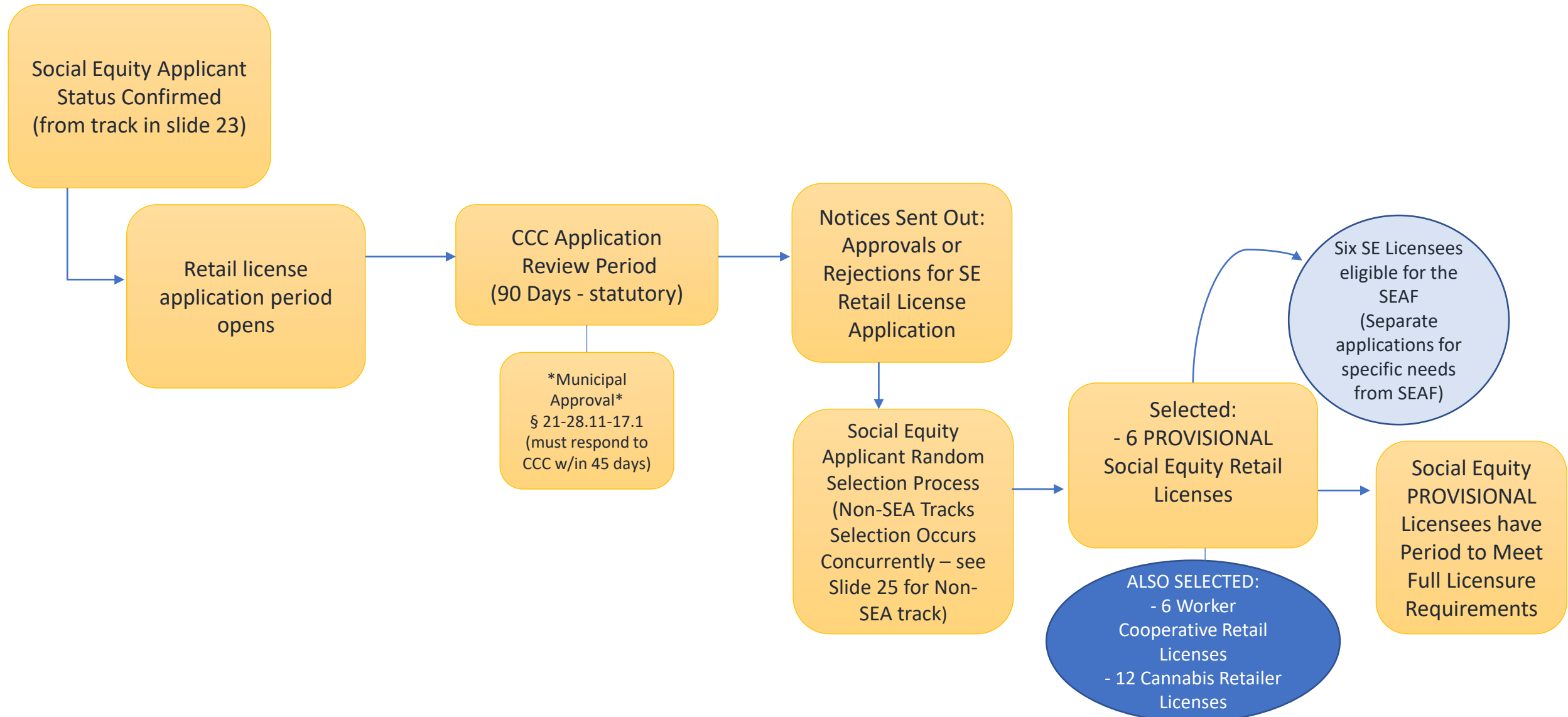

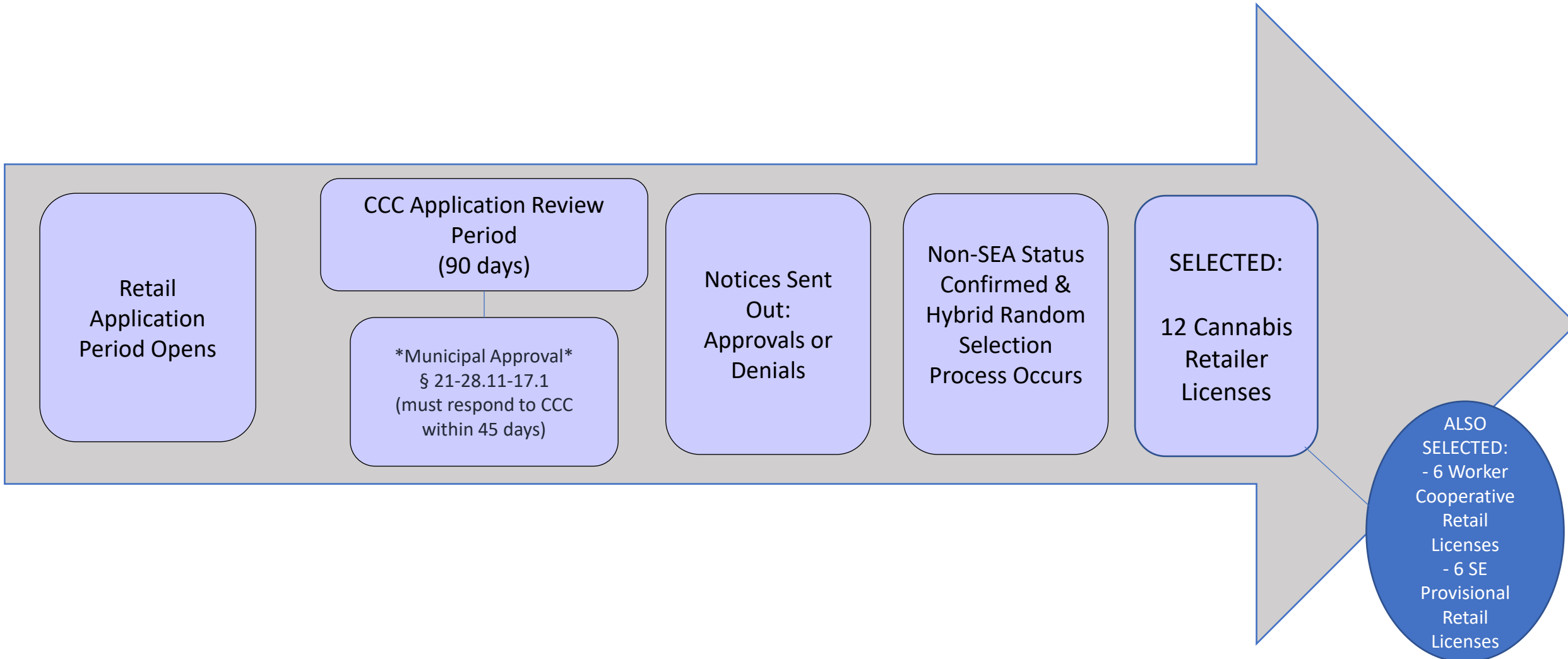


# Step 2: How do I get a Social Equity retail license?



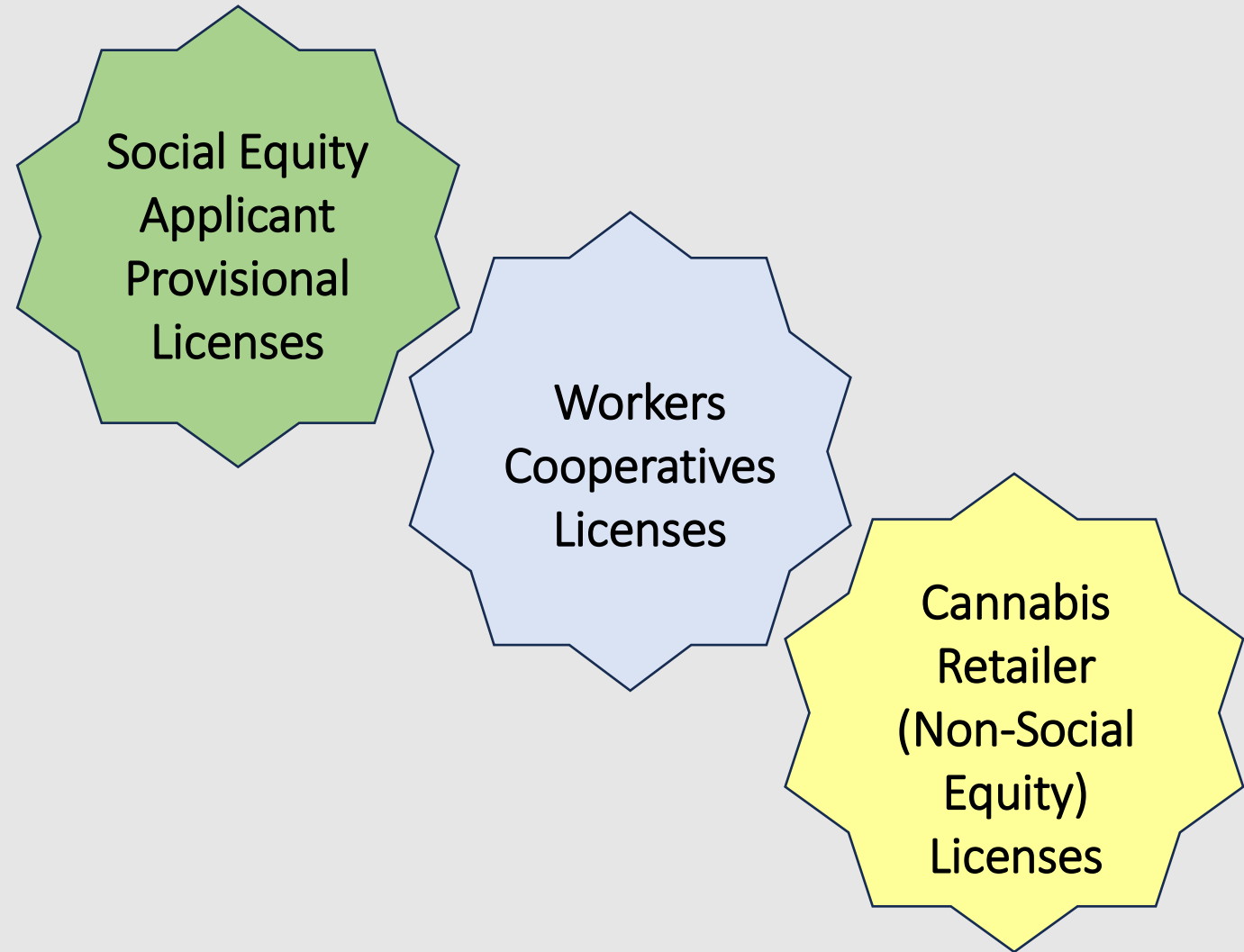


# NON-SEA Track: How do I get a retail license?

# Social Equity Assistance Fund

“There is created in the state treasury within the general fund, a fund which shall be held separate and apart from all other state monies, to be known as the social equity assistance fund.”

R.I.G.L. § 21-28.11-31(b)

“Social Equity Assistance Program and Fund”

Exclusive Uses of the SEAF:

- Provide grants to approved social equity applicants to pay for ordinary and necessary expenses to establish and/or operate a cannabis establishment, job training and workforce development, mentoring services and technical assistance
- To implement and administer programming for restorative justice, jail diversion, drug rehabilitation and education workforce development for jobs related to cannabis cultivation, transportation, distribution and sales.

# Social Equity Assistance Fund

Current Fund Balance: Approximately \$1.5 million (as of 8/2024)

## How is it Funded?

- Adult use cannabis licensing fees
  - Application fees
  - Administrative penalties received for violations
- To date, funds from the Social Equity Assistance Fund have not yet been distributed.
  - Once the rules and regulations are promulgated, the future funding of the Social Equity Assistance Fund will expand (see above).

# Fee Waivers Available for Social Equity Applicants:

“For social equity applicants as defined in § 21-28.11-3, the commission may waive up to one hundred percent (100%) of any nonrefundable license application fees or any nonrefundable fees associated with acquiring a license to operate a cannabis establishment, pursuant to rules and regulations promulgated by the commission in consultation with the cannabis advisory board.”

§ 21-28.11-31(f)(1), Social Equity Assistance Program and Fund
